Recently I was fortunate to hear Dr Sharon Goldfield – Senior Medical Advisor for the Education Department present at a Principals dinner in Melbourne. Her appointment is a first for the department where the chief priority is to provide advice on health issues pertaining on the achievement of better outcomes for our students. Dr Goldfield spoke about her commitment to the wellbeing of our youngfolk particularly when we hear of statistics such as “in OECD countries women comprise only 30 % of degrees in science and technology” and “in education our wealthier children do better than the OECD children but our poorer children do worse”

Her parting words were from Gabriela Mistral – Chilean Poet who won the 1954 Nobel Prize – “Many things we need can wait, the child cannot. Now is the time his bones are being formed, his blood is being made, his mind is being developed. To him we cannot say tomorrow – his name is today.”

DEFENCE TECHNICAL SCHOLARSHIPS

Congratulations to Sam Marshall of 11F and also James Smith of 12D who have been awarded Defence Technical Scholarships. Sam and James, who both study at least one VET subject in their VCE, applied earlier in the year and then sat a test following their application. As a year 11 student Sam is awarded \$2000 and as a year 12 student James is awarded \$3000. James and Sam will be presented with their certificates at a full school assembly next week.

Defence Technical Scholarship (DTS) is a fantastic opportunity for Year 11 and 12 students, intending to pursue an ADF general entry technical trade career after completing Year 12. The DTS rewards technically-savvy students for staying on at school and enrolling in specific subjects.

Year 11 recipients will receive \$2000, paid over two semesters and successful Year 12 students will receive \$3000, paid over two semesters. Although there is no obligation to join the Navy, Army or Air Force after finishing school, you will be required to tell us why you are interested in an ADF technical trade career as part of the selection process.

For 2010, Defence will offer up to 1,500 scholarships.

ADF GAP YEAR Applications Open for 2010

"The ADF Gap Year is about providing young Australians improved communication, leadership and problem-solving skills while having the opportunity to develop teamwork, camaraderie, integrity and self-discipline," THE HON. WARREN SNOWDON MP, Minister for Defence Science and Personnel said. "Gap Year represents a unique opportunity to undertake training, acquire transferable skills, gain independence and maturity, and become more self-reliant."

The Gap Year program has been structured to offer a meaningful experience in the ADF that will expose members to military training and lifestyle in a way that would broaden their understanding and appreciation of Service life.

"This will assist Gap Year participants in making informed decisions to undertake further service in the ADF, should they so choose," Mr Snowdon said.

"Many of them, we believe, will go on to full-time, permanent service careers, but those that don't will find the skills that they have acquired during the Gap Year service in the ADF invaluable.

"That is a worthy investment in the future of the ADF and of Australia," he concluded.

Places are limited for those interested in the ADF Gap Year, and not all applicants are guaranteed enlistment, even if they meet the eligibility criteria for ADFGY entry.

**Changes to Youth Allowance
Public forum**

Warrnambool's education leaders came together, to lead a public forum on Wednesday June 3, to protest against changes to Youth Allowance.

The South West Local Learning and Employment Network co-ordinated the forum at the Warrnambool Entertainment Centre.

A panel discussion was led by Deakin University Pro Vice-Chancellor (Rural and Regional) Sue Kilpatrick, Warrnambool College Principal Mary Pendergast, South West LLEN chairman James Dennis and expert on the costs of attending university, Vince Callaghan.

Changes announced in the Federal Budget mean students must now complete a minimum 18 months full-time work to qualify for Youth Allowance.

The move has been widely criticised as discriminatory against students in rural and regional Australia who face vastly higher costs when living away from home to attend university.

A petition was circulated at the forum and the immediate problem for students who have deferred university this year, and been affected by the government's changes for Youth Allowance, was highlighted.

The forum also looked at the long-term impact of the change which effectively takes away the only means that many young rural and regional people have to attend university.

Statistics show that rural students are four times less likely to pursue further education than their metropolitan counterparts. The main reason for this difference is the cost of further education for rural students who have to move away from home to pursue their courses.

2009 TRIP TO CHINA – A TRIP OF A LIFE TIME

In line with Brauer College's policy of offering students an opportunity to travel overseas to experience a rich and unique cultural and educational exchange, this year will again see students offered the opportunity to participate in an excursion to visit their sister school, Liangfeng High School in Zhanjigang city, Jiangsu Province, China, in November. Students will get the opportunity to be host by a local family in Zhanjiagang, interact in a range of cultural activities, including an overnight visit to Nanjing and 3 days of sightseeing and shopping in the exciting city of Shanghai.

The 14 day trip which will be offered to year 9 students and above and will take place after the VCE exams in November to enable VCE students the opportunity to participate. The successful applicants will need to be tolerant, broad-minded and willing to try new experiences. 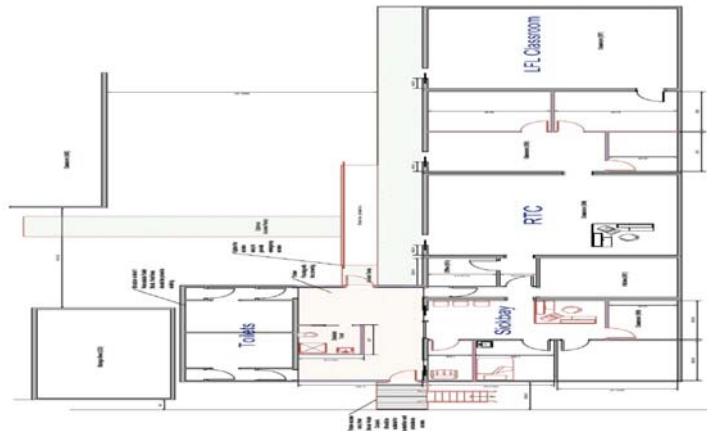

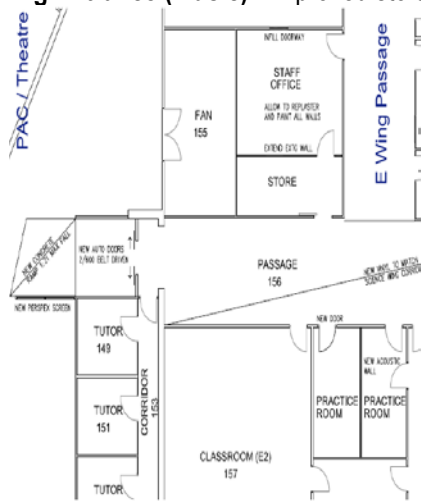
